Tours

Recent tours saw a troop from third Pinelands visiting BDKJ Gelsenkirchen and also a tour of BDKJ Gelsenkirchen visiting SA with mostly Girl Guide contacts. Harald Herzig has arranged all these Trips and it seems as if not much more will be possible through him since he has accepted a new professional position which will not give him the liberty to stay involved as before. We wish him all the best for his new endeavours.

DPSG Eichstätt area is having a return visit to the Northwest and Gauteng regions of GGASA in March 2004. Since the last visit of Sister Mary John and Bronwyn in Bavaria many good ideas and projects were discussed. Now it is the time to have a good time again and strengthen the friendship through a personal visit. Eichstätt by the way is the first DPAG area to have a structured and official South Africa team. Well done!

In May/June a Kwaito-kombo (Kuwaiti is a kind of SA HIP-HOP Music) of three guys who call themselves LIQUID, will come over to Germany and have a concert on the Katholikentag in Ulm. Other venues are to be discussed. Please advise if you are interested to host them. The group consist of three young men in the age of 22 -24 years from the Empangeni Area in KZN. They are not involved in scouting but I believe it is great opportunity to have them.

In February 2004 a high profile delegation of 22 representative of different NGO's, Departments and Members of parliament in North Rhine - Westphalia come to visit Mpumalanga. Scouting and guiding try support the trip which has been arranged by the group itself with the help of a German representative of NRW in MP and Joerg Hagmaier. It is a goal of this trip to encourage other NGO's in NRW and MP to work together like the scouts and sports youth do. The delegation will be lead by Dr. Thomas Fues the one-world commissioner of NRW and will meet the premier of MP Mr. Mahlangu. Further more they will visit various projects and try to get an understanding of the situation in MP. Hopefully the innovative networking approach between Government and NGO's will be continued and can bring some fruits later on. One fine example is the "colouring-garden" which will bring schools in NRW and MP together – with the help of scouting and guiding!

The **African Jamboree in Mozambique** is scheduled for the end of the year in December situated close to the capital Maputo at the Indian Ocean. Some German scouters have expressed their interest in attending this unique event. Our friends in South Africa will most probably join in big numbers and a contingent of 40 scouts is expected to come from Mpumalanga. So join in!

Lastly the scouts from **VCP Baden** with Stefan Klatt and **DPSG Passau** with Susi Lösch have invited a contingent of GGASA and SASA Mpumalanga area to come over in our summer. Let us hope that the scouts/rovers will be ready for it and apply in time. There will be a selection committee and hopefully everything set in time – latest in April this year.

No other tour has been scheduled yet and we would like to ask you to report well in advance if you plan to arrange a tour. We would also ask you to use the forms that we provide to you to keep SASA and GGASA HQ in Cape Town and Johannesburg informed. This is international accepted rules and we should respect that. It will also give the HQ in case of emergency the necessary info to help you. Please discuss with Uwe if any questions related to this issue is open.

Projects

The **ice-cream badge**, as it is commonly known, has been one of the success stories and it seems to continue this year. The SASA annual badge is only slowly starting to be accepted and bought by the local scout groups in MP. So we had the idea to ask scouts in Germany to ask if they would support a scout by buying this badge instead of one ice-cream and enable a scout in SA to be a member of SASA. More than 1200 scouts of German scout associations have agreed to support – an overwhelming figure that we did not expect, when Dudley gave the badges to Uwe and said: "can you do something with it?" Now w we will continue with this project and it seems as if other countries might like the idea as well. So well done.

Other troops make efforts to arrange funding for **starter kits** and **patrol boxes** or collect used scouting materials like tents and sleeping bags.

The main challenge though is with the funding of the general operations of the area HQ in Mpumalanga. Let's hope that we will be able to solve this together.

Other than that we have jointly supported a project in Cape Town called **HOKISA** (Homes for Kids in South Africa) together with the friends in Bocholt of **SINOTHANDO e.V.**

We also continue our efforts in selling products of cooperatives and grass root groups in Germany at a fair price.

Last but not least NT is one of the founders of **AKTION TAGWERK NRW**. We hope to encourage German schools and their pupils to learn more about countries in the south and north of this world and understand the interdependence between the both.
