

Totally mixed Activity Patrols were formed for the Camp games, sessions, craft bases, which included designing and making their Own District Flags.

The Community Service Project was the clearing and collecting of all foreign objects wire, sharp bits of metal, glass and plastic bags - from round the Mission and the Reserve. Several animals, including 2 large Eland had died through eating plastic bags.

Through the auspices of Rand Water Company who supplied the Test Kits, an Ecological Survey Project was carried out on the Klein Olifants River banks and the river water tested. There was an HIV/AIDS morning of talks, activities and plays made up by the Guides and Scouts themselves. This resulted in a number of Guides and Ranger Guides qualifying for the first three requirements of the National Aids Challenge. Another highlight was the Abel Tasman Barter game run by our visiting German Scouter, Stefan Klatt, which saw frantic trading between various Patrols representing countries, and resulting in the complete building of a model ship by each Patrol, to allow Abel Tasman to continue his journeys of discovery. Thanks have been expressed elsewhere in this magazine, but special thanks to Thandeka Ndhlovu, Quartermaster of the Camp, for the excellent catering.



Mpumalanga Ranger Guides are doing it again! July 2002 marks the beginning of three weeks of fun for young girls from both Germany and South Africa. The Mpumalanga Rangers will be spreading their "sunshine" in Germany by participating in community service projects and Youth Conferences. By doing this, the girls from Germany and

South Africa will work together and learn from each other while dealing with common issues like cultural diversity and AIDS awareness. The tour will take the girls to northern Germany, where they will visit the towns of Bremen, Berlin and the surrounding areas. The girls will also have the opportunity to attend an International Youth Camp, where they will meet fellow Guides and Scouts from around the world.

On the 18th August this year, we had our first 'get-together' to start our bonding process. The girls had a lot of fun playing the "Ooblie Dooblie" game and this soon broke the ice. We discussed fund raising and what they would like to do while in Ger-

many. We had our second gettogether on 10th November. The main challenge of the day was that the five girls had only R5 each to buy lunch, and had to plan together to buy a three course meal that was tasty as well as healthy! With a 15 minute time limit, the girls made sure that the concept of working as a team was emphasized. Both get-togethers have proved worth while exercises, as we have started to bond as a team. The tour promises to be an exciting adventure and we look forward to our next get-together in April 2002

"Ooblie Dooblie" Game-The players sit in a circle and are numbered, leaving out a few numbers, e.g. 1,2,3,5,6,8,9,etc. Ask the players to make sure they remember their numbers. Have a mixture of Ageous Cream and powder paint in a cup. You start the game by sitting in front of one of the players, saying the rhyme to her: "I, ooblie dooblie no. (..1) with (no) ooblie dooblies on my face, give this special cup to you Ooblie Dooblie number (e.g. 6) with (...) Ooblie Dooblies on your face, to take over from me." If you make a mistake, the other player takes a small amount of the Ooblie Dooblie mixture and dabs it on your face, then you have to start again. For every mistake you make, you get another Ooblie Dooblie. If you make no mistakes, you can then pass the cup on to the player who chooses a new player and continues the game.

ADULT LEADER TRAINING. The Mpumalanga Training Team has trained 215 Scouters during the past year, with a total of 66 brand new Scouters in our Area. Courses included Introduction to Adult Leadership, Jungle Background & Handcraft, Cub & Scout Warrant, Cub & Scout Advanced Skills, Training Aids in the Pack & Troop and Advanced Programme Planning. 
SANTA LIGHT BULB ORNAMENT

Materials: - One used white candle light bulb. One Icm white pompom. Piece of red felt or material. Strip of white cotton wool. 15 cms. Narrow ribbon. Glitter (optional). Glue.

Instructions:-

Paint the facial area with two coats of Flesh-coloured paint and allow to dry between coats

Glue black dots for eyes and



mouth, and red dot for nose. Cut pieces of cotton wool for moustache and eyebrows. To make the hat, cut a triangle of the red material and glue to cover the metal rim of the bulb. Wrap a strip of cotton wool around the base of the hat and glue in position. Glue the pompom to the top of the hat. Lightly spray the hat with clear varnish and while still wet sprinkle with glitter if wished. Seal again with clear varnish to prevent the glitter from falling off. Thread a needle with the ribbon and thread through the top of the hat. Knot ribbon at top to form a hanger.

- 4. Paint the egg red, leaving a round


section brown unpainted for the face-or paint it flesh coloured.

Choir will never forget. This was so when we left Mpumalanga on 23rd May 2001 for Germany. All first seemed like a dream, until we pinched ourselves several times to make sure! On arrival, it was inexplicable the way we were so heartily welcomed by the Germans when we made our first communication the German way "Guten Morgen!"

The vegetation is dense, with tall trees mostly. They have very strict laws on the caring of nature and its resources—waste is carefully sorted out for recycling, so there is not waste! With such a huge population of plus 80 Million many modes of transport are used, but almost every family have bicycles, and we could see even the oldest Granny riding around town. The buildings are strong and some are as old as 600 years. There's a very low crime level. The government gives every unemployed person a living wage. We learned a lot from the Germans, as much as we think they did from us.

The Scottish Scouts, a Credit to Scotland and to Scouting-The Reason Why!

The very full and comprehensive report of the Scottish Scout Expedition to South Africa 2001, received by Dudley, our Area Commissioner reveals the "secrets" of the excellent Scouting Spirit—team spirit—smartness and behaviour of the Group, as witnessed by all who came in contact with

 A series of 18 Training/Selection/Fund raising weekends were organised over a 1-2 year period prior to the expedition. This included a 10 day PLTU in Scoutcraft and expedition training.

Each participant was chosen through his/her personal application, and over two special selection weekends by a selection board of 4 leaders; the successful Scout had to satisfy each and all 4 leaders

 Attendance at all 18 training weekends was obligatory—no charge was made, and expenses were covered by fund raising events. The PLTU training was optional but the majority attended.

 Once a Scout was accepted on to the expedition it was an condition that he paid 100 pounds deposit, signed a contract which stated they were prepared to abide by the expedition rules and attend all training weekends. Acceptance could be withdrawn if the Scout failed to live up to the contract, failed to attend the training weekends, or failed to reach the required levels of physical fitness, Scouting skills and expedition skills

The aims of the Training Weekends -To build a Team spirit in advance. To ensure all participants were Team Players and were suitable for the expedition. To

ensure a high level of physical fitness through a series of fitness tests of increasing standard. To ensure a high level of Camping, hiking and back-packing skills through hill climbing and back-

packing activities. To ensure a good level of Scouting skills through training bases. To educate participants about South Africa with respect to its wildlife, culture, problems, health and safety etc. To carry out fund raising events towards the cost of Training weekends and the cost of an extra week in Cape Town. To give Scouts the experience of home hospitality with families in

the Scottish towns of Greenock and Gourock. All the above aims were met and went a long way to the success of the expedi-

The final Training weekend held 2 weeks prior to departure ensured that everyone attending was ready for the expedition, both physically and mentally, and that everyone was properly primed such that they had the correct balance of expectation and realism. As part of this process it was pointed out through talks and personal interviews that many things could go wrong on an expedition to Africa and often did. It was stressed how important it was to tackle such set backs with the right attitude and team spirit.

It was noticeable on the expedition itself that this message had been taken in by all those attending. The performance of the Scouts (and Venture Scouts) throughout the expedition was
